I wish to provide comments and feedback for consideration during the development of the new Aged Care Act.

My major concern is the recognition of human rights for people living with dementia. I was prompted reading the draft to forward the detailed email to all recipients below. I have not received responses from Parliamentarians but all other organisations have referred me to the Office of Public Advocate (Victoria) and suggested gaining private legal advice.

were unaware of any formal requirements. I find this concerning as the peak body. Elders Rights Victoria stated they could not locate any legislation protecting the human rights for people with dementia to be advised of a Guardians decision only an indication it was a "moral" responsibility. The ERA representative contacted the Office of Public Advocate to verify OPA are governed by the Guardian and Administration Act 2019, which the new Aged Care Act draft has copied and pasted the wording for Section 24. There is no legal responsibility for a Guardian to advise a person of decisions impacting their lives.

In Australia in 2024 it is time to recognise individuals living with dementia are human beings and need to be treated with dignity and respect. I appeal to all concerned developing the New Aged Care Act to incorporate the requirement that all people without discrimination are informed of decisions made by a secondary party about their lives. This is a human right that needs to be addressed.

"I have read the Charter of Human Rights 2006 and I can not see reference to the "right" of being advised of decisions made by a secondary person.

I am looking to gain information whether there is a legal responsibility for a Guardian including a Guardian of the last resort (Office of Public Advocate Victoria) to inform the person who lives with dementia of decisions made which impact their life.

Are you able to provide advice of any legislation that states all individuals in Victoria have a legal right to be informed of decisions made about their life"
