Background

Australian General Practice Training Program


- The Australian General Practice Training (AGPT)
 Program is a postgraduate vocational training
 program for medical practitioners wishing to pursue a
 career in general practice and/or rural and remote
 medicine in Australia. The AGPT Program is a three
 to four-year training program that offers 1,500 training
 places each year. Selection into the AGPT Program is
 a competitive merit-based process.
- The Department of Health currently administers the AGPT. The Program is delivered by nine Regional Training Organisations (RTOs), according to the curricula and standards set by the GP Colleges.

Australian Government Department of Health

GP Training Transition

- In 2017, the Minister for Health announced that the responsibility for the Commonwealth funded AGPT Program would transfer from the Department of Health to the General Practice (GP) colleges – the Australian College of Rural and Remote Medicine (ACRRM) and the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP).
- The GP Colleges will lead delivery of AGPT Program training from 1 February 2023. This follows a four-year transition period, which commenced in 2018.
- The transition to a College-led GP Training model will ensure consistency with other specialist medical colleges, as identified in the 2017-18 RACGP Compact and the 2018 ACRRM Compact.





GP Catchments Map






Grant Objectives

- Deliver robust, independent, evidence-based recommendations to the Department on AGPT training placement priorities at the GP catchment level, to meet the community's current and future GP workforce needs.
 - For each Primary Health Network region, document analysis underlying recommendations: current and community health needs, current training capacity, requirements to develop future training capacity, and pathways for registrars to complete all training within the region.
- Foster collaboration with relevant stakeholders in the PHN region to integrate their data, insights and expertise into the formulation of advice.

Deliverables

GP Workforce Planning and **Prioritisation Advice**

- Implementable recommendations for GP training prioritisation at GP catchment level. based on data and community need. This includes priority order of GP catchment for registrar training.
- Assessment of training capacity and training pathways, within the PHN regional boundary
- Documented consultation, including areas of stakeholder agreement and disagreement on recommendations

Roles and responsibilities

Planning & Prioritisation Organisations

- Undertake stakeholder consultation to formulate advice, including hosting a forum to test proposed recommendations with key stakeholders within each PHN region where you are performing this function.
- Prepare comprehensive, evidence-based advice comprising:
 - Priority order of GP catchments for registrar training to meet future community needs, based on workforce data, training data and local insights
 - Available training capacity (including accreditation status), identification of at-risk training sites and evidence of any training capacity gaps
 - Assessment of training pathways that enable registrars to complete all training within the PHN region.
- Build effective relationships to engage with stakeholders across the region.
- Support AGPT forward planning by regularly engaging with the GP Colleges to share progress and early findings.
- You or one consortium member must able to obtain access to the Health Demand and Supply Utilisation Patterns Planning (HeaDS UPP) Tool.
- Where needed and where entities are agreeable, seek information sharing arrangements with relevant Commonwealth-funded, jurisdictional or other stakeholders.
- Subject to privacy and confidentiality, share findings with entities undertaking relevant Commonwealth-funded activities.

Department of Health (DOH)

- In consultation with the sector, set framework and KPIs for key information requirements expected from organisations undertaking the grant activity.
- Set distribution targets for GP Colleges under College-led training grant agreements.
- Provide planning and prioritisation reports to GP Colleges.
- Review applications for new or changed access to the Health Demand and Supply Utilisation Patterns Planning (HeaDS UPP) Tool.
- If needed, update existing funding agreements to support information sharing arrangements required for this activity.

Relevant Commonwealth-funded, Jurisdictional and other stakeholders in the PHN region

- Work collaboratively with organisations selected to deliver planning and prioritisation activities and share information.
- Work with GP Colleges to take action to respond to planning and prioritisation advice.
- If needed, negotiate formal information sharing arrangements with Planning & Prioritisation Organisations.

GP Colleges

- Work collaboratively with organisations selected to deliver planning and prioritisation activities and share information.
- Make final AGPT selection and placement decisions.
- Achieve AGPT distribution targets set by DoH to meet community need.
- Take action to respond to planning and prioritisation advice.
- Deliver outcomes in the AGPT Outcomes Framework.
- If needed, negotiate formal information sharing arrangements with Planning & Prioritisation Organisations.

Grant activity and process



Grant activity overview

How much funding?

- Up to \$42.0 million over three and a half years will be available to successful grant applicants across all regions
- Each region will not receive an equal share of the \$42.0 million in funding
- It is anticipated that PHN regions that are geographically larger and cover rural and remote areas may have higher costs
- The grant opportunity will include an indicative minimum and maximum budget range

When will the activity start?

- · Grant opportunity to open in late 2021
- Grant agreement and establishment early 2022
- Funding commences FY 2022-23



Grant activity overview

Who can submit a grant application?

• This is an open, competitive grant. Any organisation is able to apply.

Can organisations apply as a consortium?

- Consortium applications are encouraged
- You must have a lead applicant/organisation

Can organisations apply to do the activity in multiple regions?

- Activities will occur within Primary Health Network regions
- You may apply to do this activity in more than one region
- You will submit one application, and must specify the regions where you propose to undertake the activity
- · Some parts of the application will need a response for each region where you want to perform the activity





The Program is designed to achieve Australian Government objectives. This grant opportunity is part of the above grant program which contributes to the Department's Outcome 1.4. The Department works with stakeholders to plan and design the grant program according to the

Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines (CGRGs).



The grant opportunity opens

We publish the grant opportunity guidelines on GrantConnect.



You complete and submit a grant application

You complete the Application Form and address all of the eligibility and assessment criteria to be considered for a grant.



We assess all grant applications

We assess the applications against eligibility criteria. We assess your eligible application against the assessment criteria including an overall consideration of value for money and compare it to other applications.



We make grant recommendations

We provide advice to the decision maker on the merits of each application.



Grant decisions are made

The decision maker decides which applications are successful.



We notify you of the outcome

We advise you of the outcome of your application. We may not notify unsuccessful applicants until grant agreements have been executed with successful applicants.



We enter into a grant agreement

We will enter into a grant agreement with you if successful. The type of grant agreement is based on the nature of the grant and will be proportional to the risks involved.



Delivery of grant

You undertake the grant activity as set out in your grant agreement. The Community Grants Hub manage the grant by working with you, monitoring your progress and making payments.



Evaluation of the grant opportunity

We evaluate your specific grant activity and the grant opportunity as a whole. We base this on information you provide to us and that we collect from various sources.
